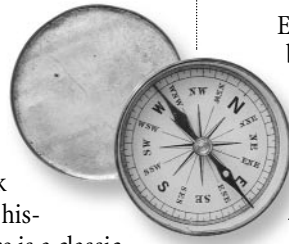


# Nob Hill Northwest Portland

The Nob Hill tour is a pleasant, easy walk centered around Couch Park, with many historic houses situated close together. There is a classic house nearly every block for six blocks along Twentieth Avenue! With six examples, this walk focuses on the Colonial Revival style of architecture. The Abbott Mills house, designed by a famous Boston firm, was fashioned after a mid-eighteenth century Georgian colonial house in Pennsylvania. Among the notable houses of other styles are: the Mackenzie house, an important Shingle/Richardsonian house built by the famous duo Whidden and Lewis; and the Landenberger house, one of the first houses in Portland to speak for the new Craftsman style.



1. White  
1903 • Colonial Revival  
311 NW 20th Ave.  
Entrance facade framed by Corinthian pilasters and flanked by Roman Doric and square columns.

2. Heusner  
1892 • Shingle  
333 NW 20th Ave.  
Corner tower with bell-shaped roof, wrap-around veranda. Ashlar-patterned sandstone foundation, chimneys, and pillars.

3. Mackenzie  
1892 • Richardsonian  
615 NW 20th Ave.  
Massive stonework, slate shingles, and arched entrance porch. Arched window recess with a cast-iron stag's head above the square bay.

4. Mills  
1908 • Colonial Revival  
733 NW 20th Ave.  
Symmetrical front elevation, with entrance hall extension. A shield-and-swag design within pediment.

5. Veness  
1910 • Craftsman/Colonial  
811 NW 20th Ave.  
Simple roof adorned with recessed windows and wrap-around eaves.

6. Ayer  
1903 • Jacobethan  
811 NW 19th Ave.  
Recessed entrance framed by brick gabled extensions.

7. Ayer  
1890 • Colonial Revival  
1809 NW Johnson St.  
Semi-circular entrance porch with fine Roman Doric columns and a simple, low balustrade.

8. Landenberger  
1895 • Craftsman  
1805 NW Glisan St.  
Dynamic projection of eaves and continuation of main roof slope over entrance porch.

9. Friedlander  
c. 1890 • Shingle  
2233 NW Flanders St.  
Shingle siding with oval designs in diagonal patterns, round corner tower with conical roof.

10. Trevitt  
1890 • Colonial Revival  
2347 NW Flanders St.  
Paired polygonal bays and a full-facade veranda with paired posts and lattice-work.

11. Noble  
c. 1895 • Shingle  
2370 NW Flanders St.  
Ashlar-bond stonework chimney, foundations, and terrace work.

12. Wallace  
1888 • Colonial Revival  
2381 NW Flanders St.  
Symmetrical facade, remodeled porch with side wings, and ashlar-bond stonework and foundation walls.

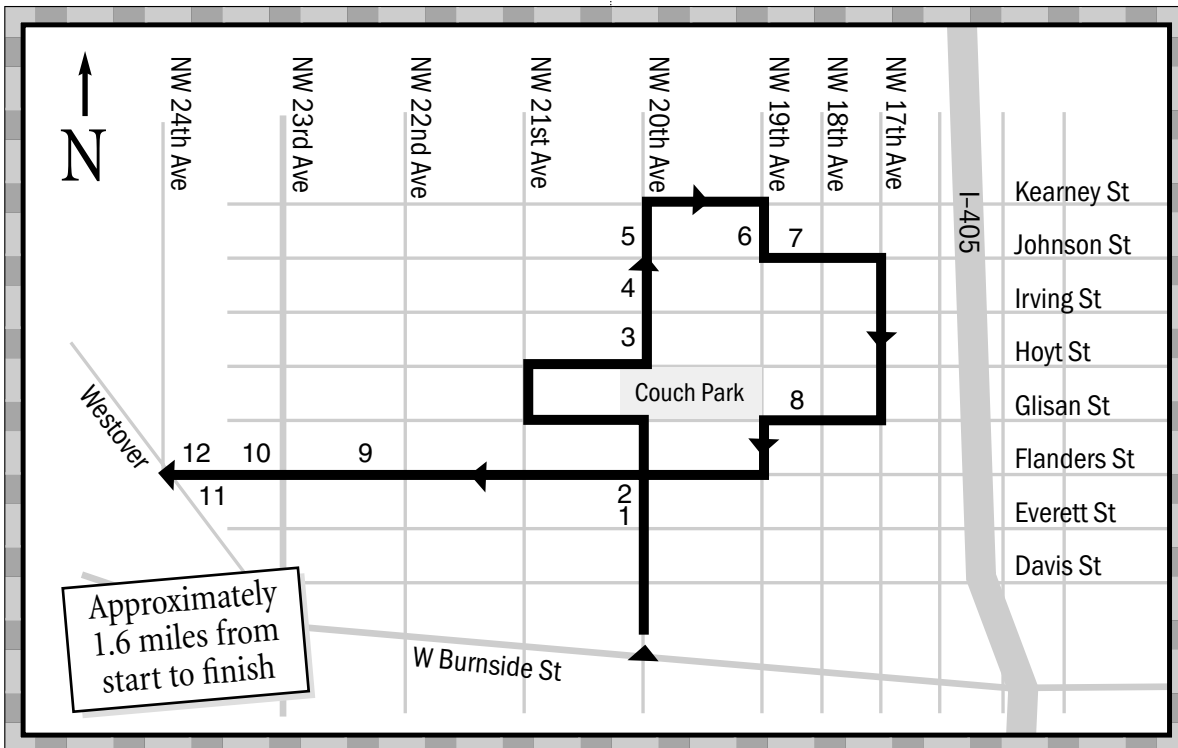


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
